VI. RECOGNITIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

A. Recognition of Andrew Hansen as EMS
Instructor of the Year

President Hayes said this week is EMS Services Week as proclaimed by Governor Rauner. Deputy Fire Chief Rick Manthy said this is an opportunity to recognize first responders' efforts. In Arlington Heights, they respond to more than 10,000 alarms a year. Andrew Hansen helped create a trial for a new piece of equipment that improves the rate of success in life saving procedures. Mr. Hansen was recruited to expand his teaching throughout the Northwest suburbs and his method is used as a national standard. Mr. Hansen was awarded the Illinois State EMS Instructor of the Year. In addition, Chief Koeppen presented him with the Fire Chief's Award for his service and accomplishments.

Resident Richard Redig and his partner Georgine LeBeaux shared that on March 19th Richard had a heart attack. Responders were there in less than 5 minutes. Ms. LeBeaux said they began CPR and attached the Lucas machine to Mr. Redig. After 23 minutes, they got a pulse. The team again administered CPR upon arriving at the hospital. Mr. Redig was in the hospital four weeks, and said if not for the quick response, he would not be

here today. He especially thanked Andrew Hansen, Matthew Walters, Ryan Glendenning, Jason Horlacher, Brian Buchek, Les East, and Lloyd Wollert for saving him. Mr. Redig thanked the Chief Koeppen, the Police Department, the Village Board, the Foreign Fire Insurance Tax Board, and the firefighters who visited him in the hospital.

- B. Toy Shop & Motolounge - 1728 W. Algonquin Rd. - PC#18-003 Approved
Special Use Permit for Motor Vehicle Sales,
Parking Variations

Anthony Borowczyk, Mike Taylor, and Laura Packevicuite represented The Toy Shop & Motolounge. Mr. Borowczyk said the business specializes in motorcycle gear, parts and accessories. It used to host Bike Nights, but because the neighbors did not like them, they have discontinued them. They can park 56 bikes in 16 spaces so would like to waive a traffic study as their parking is for motorcycles. Bikes are kept indoors when they are being serviced. The Toy Shop is petitioning to allow sales and service of motorcycles in a B-2. There are similar businesses like Arlington Motorsports located near residential areas, which sell bikes and do repairs. Their building is a solid masonry building so sounds are kept inside. If speaker installs became a problem they would stop doing speaker installs. The loudest equipment is an air compressor. Mr. Borowczyk said they will comply with all and any stipulations. Their outdoor storage has been removed and they are working on getting a new sign to comply with code. The 6" fire single check valve is being removed and replaced with an approved RPZ. They will remove the 6' fence and replace it with an 8' fence. Two new shade trees will be installed in the parking lot. The overhead door shall be closed during service.

President Hayes said the information provided stated there would be no service after 6 p.m., and they are closed on Mondays. Mr. Borowczyk said they will not do service on Sundays and maybe not on Saturdays either.

Mr. Enright said the Plan Commission voted in favor 4-3. Parking is sufficient. Staff was initially opposed to the variations, but are now more at ease, because of the agreements and restrictions. Many of the concerns revolved around Bike Nights. As the petitioner has indicated, they will not be doing them anymore, and they will not host outdoor events. Putting in a new fence is a positive. The petitioner has cleaned up the site. It is good to

hear the HVAC is working to keep noise in. Big concerns were the revving of engines and speaker installations. With the conditions proposed and action from the petitioner, staff now thinks this could work. Its success is predicated on the business operating in good faith.

Trustee Rosenberg asked about test drives and if only used bikes would be sold. Mr. Borowczyk said all their bikes for sale will be used. There will be test drives, but testers must have a valid M class license. Evening test drives could occur. The State has laws and restrictions, and there is no selling on Sundays. They will not allow test drives after 6 p.m. Trustee Rosenberg asked what kinds of service they would perform. Mr. Borowczyk said they will not service engines. Ms. Packeviciute said they would outsource engine service. Mr. Taylor said there are not warranties on used bikes and explained that each manufacturer has a diagnostic device for their engines and The Toy Shop does not have those diagnostic devices, so engine service would not be possible. Used bikes are sold as is, if there is a manufacturer's warranty, customers have to take the bike to the manufacturer. Mr. Borowczyk said they install parts, gear, and accessories. Allowing them to install these items will make up for the revenue lost on Bike Nights.

Trustee Sidor said he did not have any issues with the petition. The shop would not make more noise than any neighborhood garage. He asked if mufflers would be sold and if so, how will they be tested. Mr. Taylor said revving the engine is not required to make sure the part is good to go. He acknowledged there are some loud motorcycles that visit their shop. Trustee Sidor said this is a good location for this project and he was taking the team at their word that they would be good neighbors.

Trustee Baldino asked about the perfect fit program. Mr. Taylor said they make sure the gear is sized correctly for the rider and the bike, it is a safety program. Trustee Baldino said his concerns were about night noise, so he was glad there were no bike nights, and no service Sunday or Monday. He asked what the zoning was for other businesses that do repair. Mr. Recklaus said Arlington Motorsports was in a B-2.

Trustee LaBedz asked if the ventilation would be proper and about the noise level. Mr. Borowczyk said there is an HVAC fan that is no louder than an air conditioner fan. Mr. Enright said HVAC creates some level of noise, no matter what kind of business is there. Trustee LaBedz said to be cognizant of closing the trash enclosure door at the end of the day. She asked why there were motorcycles in the showroom window. Ms. Packeviciute said they have a winter storage program.

Trustee Tinaglia said Arlington Motorsports is a good neighbor, and he expected The Toy Shop to be too. He said he hoped they can live up to what they said. The kinds of maintenance planned is not noisy, people could do it in their garage. He warned them that the store could be a rally point, so to be careful.

Trustee Glasgow told the petitioners to be concerned about the neighbors; the 8' fence could alleviate a good deal of the neighbor's concerns.

President Hayes said he was comfortable with the proposal after driving through the property. He did not believe the neighborhood would be adversely impacted.

Special Use Permit for Amusement Facility,
Large

Trustee Sidor said he was recusing himself as he had a professional relationship with entities tangentially related to this matter. He left the room at this time.

Dave Gillespe, architect for the project, said the developer is proposing a health club with a climbing facility. First Ascent is for adult climbers and Funtopia is for children. The plan is for these two climbing models to occupy different sides of the space. Funtopia hosts birthday parties and estimates they may have 200 children and parents during their busiest times. Funtopia and First Ascent are busy at different times of the day. Because of the birthday party operation, they are requesting a Special Use for food service. They plan to serve pizza to patrons only. They agree with all the proposed recommendations from staff and agree to comply with those recommendations.

President Hayes asked if they plan to apply for a liquor license in the future. Mr. Gillespe said there are no plans now, but he could not speak to the future.

Mr. Enright explained that before the developer moves forward with its proposed residential build out on the PUD site, there are conditions for parking counts to be done after the climbing facility is open to understand the impacts.

President Hayes asked what the supervision requirements were for Funtopia. Mr. Gillespe said staff provides supervision; parents are not required to be present. Patrons are often dropped off. The number of bike spaces were dictated on the Code's occupancy ratio.

Trustee Tinaglia said this is going to be a destination place that will

sponsor major events. Mr. Gillespe said First Ascent would be the tallest space for rock climbing in the area. Trustee Tinaglia asked if the petitioner agreed with the nine conditions. Mr. Gillespe said yes.

Trustee LaBedz asked if Funtopia would have adult activities too. Mr. Gillespe said no, the floor is accessible to adults for supervision, but adults are not on the climbing structures. There are zoned areas based on age. Their hours are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday –Thursday and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday-Sunday.

Trustee Rosenberg questioned the PUD's changed layout. Mr. Enright clarified the revised plan. The D Zone is hotel/restaurant. The E Zone will be residential. Zone C is land banked but may become Senior Living. There could be 440 residential units in Zone C. A parking garage will be added in the next phase and will have 1.5 spaces per unit in the D Zone, which will be sufficient.

Trustee Blackwood wondered why Funtopia would be open during the day while school is in session. Mr. Gillespe could not answer exactly, but the daytime hours are similar to their other locations.

Trustee Baldino asked where the storm water will go. Mr. Enright said there are several detention vaults and some water is diverted to a pond on the northwest side.

Trustee Jim Tinaglia moved to approve. Trustee Robin LaBedz Seconded the Motion.

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING PREVAILING WAGES

WHEREAS, in 1941, the State of Illinois enacted “An Act Regulating Wages of Laborers, Mechanics and Other Workers Employed in any Public Works by the State, County, City or any Public Body or any Political Subdivision or by Anyone Under Contract for Public Works,” 820 ILCS 130/1 et seq. (“Act”) and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that all Illinois governmental entities, including home rule units of local government, either accept the prevailing wages determined by the Illinois Department of Labor or investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in the Act for workers employed to perform work on public works construction projects in the locality in which the work is performed,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF ARLINGTON HEIGHTS:

SECTION ONE: To the extent required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is hereby ascertained to be, except as provided in Section Two herein, the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the Cook County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of September 1, 2017 with corrected rates through May 24, 2018, with a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by the Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department’s June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Village. The definition of any terms appearing in this Resolution which are also used in the Act shall be the same as in the Act.

SECTION TWO: The definition of landscape laborer, landscape foremen, landscape driver, and landscape operator for purposes of this Resolution shall be one who performs work in connection with the general maintenance of lawns and landscape such as lawn mowing and grass cutting, tree and shrub pruning, the planting of annuals, the replacement of pre-existing shrubs and trees, grass seeding and fertilizing and herbicide application, laying sod, and the planting of tree and shrubs. The aforementioned work shall be considered landscape maintenance work. The landscape maintenance work covered by this Resolution shall not include landscape construction work.

SECTION THREE: Landscape construction work is any and all work performed by a landscape laborer, landscape foreman, landscape driver, and landscape operator in connection with contracts for: (1) the original installation of any landscaping materials on any new construction projects; (2) landscaping done in connection with any road, boulevard, street, highway, bridge, park, sewer or underground utility construction project; (3) lawn and landscape restoration where there has been new utility construction or installation involving trenches and manholes, pipes, cables, and conduits; (4) the preparation and landscaping of approaches associated with construction involving shafts, tunnels, subways, and sewers; (5) the landscaping of the old and new site where underpinning, lagging, bracing, propping, and shoring has

occurred; and (6) landscaping associated with construction involving general excavation and grading and the general landscaping of wrecked structures. Landscape construction work is covered by the prevailing wage schedule promulgated by the Illinois Department of Labor, attached to this Resolution. Landscaping work of all types performed by Village employees is excluded from coverage.

SECTION FOUR: Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed to apply the general prevailing rate of wages to any work or employment except public works construction of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION FIVE: The Village Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection, by any interested party in the main office of the Village, this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION SIX: The Village Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

SECTION SEVEN: The Village Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Resolution with the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

SECTION EIGHT: The Village Clerk shall cause to be posted on the Village of Arlington Heights' website, www.vah.com, a copy of this Resolution, and such posting shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of the Village.

RESOLUTIONS:Prevailing Wages 2018

On August 31, 2017, IDOL published technical corrections to the rates originally posted on August 15, 2017. Revised rates are highlighted in yellow in the county rate schedules in which they appear. Additionally, rates for certain Electricians, Plumbers, and Pipefitters classifications that were mistakenly included in the rate schedules originally published for some counties were eliminated, and in Henry County, certain rates that had been erroneously included for the classification of Operating Engineers were eliminated. Revised rates published on August 31, 2017 are effective as of September 1, 2017.

On September 25, 2017, April 11, 2018, and May 24, 2018, IDOL published subsequent rounds of technical corrections to the Prevailing Wage schedules that were originally published on August 15, 2017. Rates revised on September 25, 2017 are highlighted in green in the county rate schedules in which they appear. Rates revised on April 11, 2018 are highlighted in blue in the county rate schedules in which they appear. Rates revised on May 24, 2018 are highlighted in gray in the county rate schedules in which they appear. The corrected rates published on September 25, 2017, April 11, 2018, and May 24, 2018 are effective as of the date of their publication.

November 7, 2017 IDOL published a small round of technical corrections which applies to certain fringe benefits for the Pipefitter classification in some counties. These changes are highlighted in pink. Corrected rates are effective the date of their publication (November 7, 2017).

November 28, 2017 IDOL published a change to the foreman rate for the Traffic Safety Worker Classification in Cook County. This change is highlighted in pink. The corrected rate is effective the date of its publication (November 28, 2017).

Explanations COOK COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

TRUCK DRIVERS (WEST) - That part of the county West of Barrington Road.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date. ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

3. The existing ground sign located in the front yard shall be removed or brought into conformance with all signage regulations, well as the temporary ground sign that advertises for The Toy Shop.
4. The Petitioner shall be prohibited from conducting outdoor events on the subject property.
5. The existing six inch fire single check valve shall be removed and replaced with an approved RPZ.
6. The eight foot tall slatted chain link fence along the rear property line shall be replaced with an eight foot tall solid wood fence. Additionally, the slatted chain link dumpster enclosure shall be replaced with a wood enclosure of suitable height to screen the dumpsters.

The attached proposed text amendments to Chapter 28 defines both microbreweries and breweries, as well as brew pubs. The Plan Commission motion below recommends modifications to the definitions of Microbrewery and Brewery, however staff does not concur with those modifications as the Board has already approved the definitions as part of Chapter 13 amendments, therefore the definitions should match. Staff has made two minor modifications to the proposed permitted uses related to a Brewery to clarify intent (modifications are underlined).

A public hearing was held by the Plan Commission on May 23, 2018 where Commissioner Dawson moved and Commissioner Sigalos seconded:

A motion to recommend to the Village Board of Trustees, approval of PC#18-012, Amendments to Chapter 28, Section 28-3 and Section 28-5.5-1, regarding Brew Pubs, Microbreweries, and Breweries, with the proposed language, however, with the change that the definition of brewery be changed to include that it brews more than 930,000 gallons of beer per year, and the definition of microbrewery to eliminate the language from generally characterized by an emphasis on quality, flavor, and such down to the comma there so it would read an independently-owned brewery that produces no more than 930,000 gallons of beer per year and which is licensed as a Class 1 brewer by the State of Illinois.

Roll Call Vote: Commissioners Dawson, Lorenzini, Sigalos, and Chair Ennes voted in favor. Commissioner Green voted against. Motion carried.

The Village Board recently discussed establishing new liquor licenses to allow microbreweries and breweries. The attached proposed text amendments to Chapter 28 defines both microbreweries and breweries, as well as brew pubs. The Board is seeking a recommendation on how to zone for these uses, which is also attached as part of an amendment to the Permitted Use Table.

Brew Pubs: Shall be treated no different than a restaurant and thus eligible for a Special Use Waiver if less than 4,000 square feet in size.

Microbrewery: Small microbreweries that are 2,500 square feet or less would be permitted uses in B2, B3, and B5 (downtown). Microbreweries above 2,500 square feet up to 4,000 square feet, would be Special Uses in B2, B3, and B5.

In addition, only a certain percentage of the space (35% maximum) could be allocated to the “retail portion” of the space. The retail portion would include areas for sales of packaged beer, as well as seating areas for consumption of microbrews.

Brewery: These would be permitted uses in M1 and M2 but no larger than 20,000 square feet. The “retail portion” of the space shall not exceed 10% of the floor area. Staff also recommends that a brewery shall not be permitted on a zoning lot contiguous to a residential zoning district.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: I'm calling this meeting of the Arlington Heights Plan Commission to order. Would you all please rise and join us in the pledge of allegiance?

(Pledge of allegiance.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay. Bill, would you take roll call?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes. Commissioner Cherwin.

(No response.)

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Dawson.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Here.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Drost.

(No response.)

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Green.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Here.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Jensen.

(No response.)

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Lorenzini.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Here.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Sigalos.

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: Here.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Warskow.

(No response.)

MR. ENRIGHT: Chairman Ennes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Here. So, we have three sets of minutes from our last meeting on the, let's see, the --

COMMISSIONER GREEN: 9th, May 9th.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: 9th. Have you all received that?

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Everybody had the time to review them?

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Do we have a motion to approve?

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: I'll make that motion to approve it.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Second.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: And a second. All in favor?

(Chorus of ayes.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Any opposed?

(No response.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, we have one other item of business, and that is a proposal to have a new zoning ordinance for the brew pubs/breweries. I guess we'll have a Staff report.

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes. Public notice was published in the newspaper 15 days ago as required by law. The Village Board has been discussing recently a new liquor license, a couple of new liquor license categories: one for brew pubs which is, basically, that's restaurants who brew their own beer on site; microbreweries which are solely small breweries; and then breweries which make larger quantities. The proposed liquor licenses were discussed a couple of months ago, six weeks ago by the Board, and they were generally positive towards creating these liquor licenses. However, before they make any decisions, they want to have the

Plan Commission advise the Village Board and make a recommendation on what zoning districts these would be appropriate in terms of location. So, right now, the Village zoning ordinance does not microbreweries or breweries in the Village, so this would be new, and thus, the text amendment to Chapter 28 to allow these types of uses.

Obviously, there's a lot of, you know, trends towards microbreweries and breweries and the tastings that go with those, as well as brew pubs which are basically restaurants. However, the Village is, you know, it doesn't allow it right now, so we want to kind of catch up with the trends and think it's a good economic development tool to bring in new types of businesses in the town, and not only downtown but other shopping centers that we have throughout the town.

Regarding the proposal, we're recommending, and this was discussed by the Ordinance Review Committee or Subcommittee of the Plan Commission, recommended approval of these changes to the zoning code. Of course, this is not the liquor license. That can only be discussed and approved by the Village Board, but creating brew pubs which would be special uses in our commercial districts similar to restaurants. So, right now, we allow as of right through a waiver process if you're a 4,000 square feet or less restaurant. If you're above 4,000 square feet, you have to get a special use which is about a three-month public hearing process with the Plan Commission and Village Board. So, we want to treat those brew pubs the same, so basically those are just restaurants that make beer on site. Very simple, no different than a restaurant. So, that would be a brew pub.

Microbrewery, we're suggesting that there's two categories--small and larger. So, 2,500 square feet or less would be permitted in our B-2, B-3, and B-5 districts. B-2 and B-3 are most of our shopping centers which you'd find on major roads. B-5 is of course the downtown. So, if the microbrewery is less than 2,500 square feet, it would be permitted. However, there would be some restrictions on how much area you could have for seating and for selling the product on site to 35 percent of the total floor area. With that equation, based on our building codes, you could get around 58 persons total capacity in a size of 2,500 or less. That would be the maximum you could get in the location.

It hasn't been determined yet whether or not any food will be required. The Board is well aware that, you know, this is not a restaurant and it's not going to have a full kitchen. These are mostly just making beer on site in small quantities and having tastings and selling the beer pre-packaged, and the people can sit there and have a certain amount.

The liquor license at this point is proposed to have some quantity caps, but 48 ounces is per individual. I don't know if that would be part of the final liquor license or not. Also, the Board talked a little bit about food items, like small snack items, nothing that would have to be made in a kitchen. So, that's going to be deliberated, too, whether or not that's going to be required. I think the Board is kind of, you know, half and half on that part of it. But I wouldn't be surprised if there's some sort of small food item required, like chips or something.

Microbreweries above 2,500 square feet, those would be larger in size, up to 4,000 maximum would be special uses in the B-2, B-3, and B-5 districts. They would have to go through a public hearing process as those would be a little bit, you know, bigger and more capacity. With 4,000 square feet, you could probably get closer to 100 people. So, you know, we're looking at the larger ones having a little more oversight in terms of zoning. Keep in mind, we don't allow these at all right now.

Then lastly, breweries where you simply make beer and, you know, they have tastings and they usually have small areas where they'll be able to, you know, have a small bar or something to taste the beers that are made on site and are distributed. We're saying that breweries could be allowed up to 20,000 square feet. We don't want giant breweries like you might find in the city. We just want smaller, medium-sized ones maximum. We don't allow the making of alcohol and breweries in the Village at all, and that would be regulated and permitted in the M-1, M-2 districts, the two manufacturing districts that we have.

One thing we didn't discuss at Ordinance Review that we are suggesting though is that breweries are not allowed on a zoning lot that's contiguous to a residential zoning district. That will mostly come into play on the north end of town where you have the north industrial park zoned M-1. There's a lot of residential homes that are directly abutting probably about 15 or so commercial properties that potentially could have a brewery if this was approved. We're saying that those properties, they would not be allowed because they're too close to residential, a little bit of concern about, you know, odors potentially. But that leaves a lot of land available for breweries throughout the M-1 and M-2, we've got 108 acres in town. We just don't want these right next to homes.

So, that's the recommendation of Staff as well as the Ordinance Review Committee. So, I'd like to open it up for questions.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, can we have a motion to approve the Staff report?

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: I'll make that motion.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: And a second?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Second.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: All in favor?

(Chorus of ayes.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Anybody opposed?

(No response.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, do any of the Commissioners have questions?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I do. Am I the only one who maybe wasn't at ORC?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: I think there's a couple questions even from those who were there.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay, go ahead. Do you want me to start?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Go ahead, yes, please.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Where did the definition, where did you pull the definitions from?

MR. ENRIGHT: Part of it's the state liquor license requirements. So, microbreweries in Illinois, the liquor license that we're proposing allows that amount of, you know, alcohol be produced in a microbrewery. So, we tied it to the liquor license requirements.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, the liquor license, the state statute relative to liquor licenses, this is how they define these terms?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay, because they seem, it doesn't seem clear to me what the difference is between these three things. I get it when you say it but, you know, a brew pub is a restaurant that includes a brewery as an accessory, I understand that.

But then we're in the definition of microbrewery and we don't say that a microbrewery is a brewery that has as its primary function brewing beer and may have food as an accessory use, right? So, I'm just, and I'm looking at this definition and it's saying generally characterized by an emphasis of quality, flavor and brewing technique. Well, I think that like the Miller Company would probably say they do that, too. I would disagree with them, but they would say that. So, I don't feel that the definition of microbrewery to me really clarifies, and if I were coming in trying to figure out what I am, I might not, it might not be as clear as it could be.

I think, I'm glad we're putting this in the code. This is a very new trend that's going on. Arlington Heights doesn't currently have anything that fits this, is that correct?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes, we don't.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Right, and they're popping up and they're very popular, and I'm glad that we're having the foresight to put it in. I'm very supportive of the way that you divided it out and who gets special use and who doesn't. I just think the definitions, we might need to clarify them a bit.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, any other questions?

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Yes. Bill, so brew pubs, that's new, too, to the code?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes, we want to clarify that, that we would allow it. Yes, it would be new.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: So, we don't have any brew pubs now in town?

MR. ENRIGHT: We do not.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Okay, and then the difference between the permitted use and special use, a special use would have to go through a public hearing.

MR. ENRIGHT: That's correct.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Now, the brewery, is there going to be any, you mentioned about maybe chips or something for microbreweries, what about breweries? Is there going to be any tie to --

MR. ENRIGHT: That remains to be seen, but that's not a zoning matter. It's up to the Village Board to decide if any food items will be required for either of those.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Okay, are we, in any way, are we covering like a tasting room, you know, where they give out free samples?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes, those would be allowed in breweries where they have tastings. I mean microbreweries are kind of that, too, but they're more bars where you sit down and try out the different beers. But you do that at a brewery, too.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: But would we regulate whether or not they charge? You know, because obviously some of the big companies give the stuff for free. You know, would we limit --

MR. ENRIGHT: That will be handled through the liquor license, that's not a zoning issue.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Okay, all right. The maximum area allowed for the retail portion of the space, 35 percent, I guess we want to make sure it doesn't turn into a large bar, correct?

MR. ENRIGHT: That's correct.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Okay, all right. That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Anyone else? No? Bill, a couple of questions. I know I should know this, but we have the brew pubs can be in B-1, what's the difference between a B-1 and a B-2?

MR. ENRIGHT: B-1 is more restrictive in terms of the types of uses that are allowed. It does allow restaurants though. They're typically smaller shopping centers. Personally, I don't think we even need the B-1 district, we should probably get rid of it. We only have one or two small shopping centers that are B-1. But the theory, historically, has been that it's less intense because it's adjacent to residential; but quite frankly, all our B districts are adjacent to residential.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: It's more of a little neighborhood shopping center.

MR. ENRIGHT: In theory, yes. But practically, it's a little different.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, and the difference between the S's and the P's on your chart for the proposed, is the S the special use?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: And the P is?

MR. ENRIGHT: Permitted use.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Permitted, okay. Do we have to be concerned about any parking issues with some of these?

MR. ENRIGHT: No different than, you know, looking at it from a, you know, restaurant --

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Restaurant standpoint?

MR. ENRIGHT: Type of use in that, which they're already, you know, we do have concerns about that with any use like that.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, that's all I have. I notice we have a number of people in the --

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Chairman, can I ask one more question?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Yes, please.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: I thought of one other thing. The area where the Knights of Columbus and Heller Lumber is at, what type of zoning is over there?

MR. ENRIGHT: That's zoned multi-family residential.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: The whole street?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Okay.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Didn't that used to be manufacturing?

MR. ENRIGHT: Used to be, it's not anymore.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, anybody else? I notice we have a number of people here to hear this. Do any of you want to make comments or have any questions? I invite you up, feel free.

What I'd like you to do is to give us your name, and I would like you to spell it for our court reporter just so we get it right. That would be good.

QUESTIONS FROM THE AUDIENCE

MS. EGAN: I'm Kathleen Egan, K-a-t-h-l-e-e-n E-g-a-n.

MR. VALENTE: Mike Valente, V like in Victor, a-l-e-n-t-e.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay.

MS. EGAN: So, we actually have been involved as the potential brewery, microbrewery, I'm not really sure. The definitions are a little confusing for us as well. We're a microbrewery by definition by the TTB because of the size and the amount of beer that we would be producing, and that we are looking to put a tap room in as well. So, a tap room would be where we would sell our product by the glass in accordance with our liquor license, whether it's, we're kept to a certain amount of ounces or whatever the case may be. Each village has a different ordinance or requirement with their village license.

So, I guess we came in to that area on Hickory, the area that you were just referencing by the Knights of Columbus, five years, six years.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: You submitted a proposal, right?

MS. EGAN: Right.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Correct, sure.

MS. EGAN: So, we own a property there and we rented, we went to the Village prior to renting there, told them that we're planning on doing manufacturing beer but that was it at that point. Then we were given permission, well, we were given a letter that stated that use was permitted, and then when we went to pull our permit we found out that the use was not permitted for alcohol. So, we're allowed to manufacture non-alcoholic beverages, but at the time we had told what we were doing down the Village and there was miscommunication or misunderstanding.

So, I think, and I guess can I just ask this, Bill, are we grandfathered in M-2, because we were there prior to the overlay?

MR. ENRIGHT: Not for these uses, no, because these are new.

MS. EGAN: Okay, so, but we're still, if we weren't doing that use, we would still be considered M-2?

MR. ENRIGHT: No, but whatever uses are allowed in the M-2 district at the time we changed the zoning to residential, those uses would be permitted.

MS. EGAN: So, the manufacturing of non-alcoholic beverages at that point would be. So, we would need a land use variation if we, because it's not zoned in that area for these businesses to be permitted?

MR. ENRIGHT: That's right.

MS. EGAN: Okay. So, we bought, we rented first and we bought with this letter and thinking that we were able to do this there and found out we couldn't. In the meantime, like you're saying, the industry has evolved and the tap room because part of the whole concept, so we wanted to go for the entire thing. We were still, you know, not getting the feeling and they didn't have a liquor license created here in Arlington Heights, we went out to Itasca, opened the tap room there in the country club. So, in the Itasca Country Club, when you walk in, they have a public restaurant called the Fox & Turtle, so I mean anyone is welcome to come, I think you'll see that it's not an issue, we're in a country club and we're in a restaurant actually. Well, adjacent to the restaurant.

So, we're just, you know, hoping that we can carry through with our plans. We, you know, have it all in there waiting. The equipment has been there untouched, un-running, hoping that we can get the zone for that area. Now, we have a liquor license, or would have a potential liquor license based on, we went up in front of the Board, the Board created it,

so that's where we stand. If you have questions for us?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: I don't. Does anybody else have a question?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Well, I just want to clarify because you said that you agree that the definitions are a bit confusing. So, could you just elaborate on what is confusing to you?

MS. EGAN: Yes. I only caught part of it, but even at the Board meeting I was a little confused. So, it's based on volume that you produce, how you're defined.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Right.

MS. EGAN: You know --

MR. VALENTE: May I for a second? So, you guys actually have this outlined pretty accurately on your proposed amendments to the zoning code on your website. So, like Kathleen was mentioning, it's really based on volume. But it's up to each individual village to kind of allow how far you guys want to take that as far as retail component, serving component. Yes, we are governed by the state but also by you guys. It seems like you've already addressed that at the last meeting in front of the Board, you guys made amendments.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: When you say the last meeting, what are you talking about?

MS. EGAN: We're talking about the Board, the Board meeting.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: The Village Board.

MR. VALENTE: The Village Board.

MS. EGAN: When they created the liquor license.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: When?

MR. ENRIGHT: It hasn't been created. Let me go on the record that it hasn't been adopted yet.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: This is a proposal we're considering.

MS. EGAN: But you are, it's just the intention, didn't they vote that night?

MR. VALENTE: I thought they did vote that night.

MR. ENRIGHT: They did not, no. But they want --

MS. EGAN: But the intention is to possibly vote on it?

MR. ENRIGHT: In June, yes.

MS. EGAN: In June, okay.

MR. ENRIGHT: When this has gone through.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: But I guess what I was saying, just because a lot of the stuff that you're mentioning I think relates to liquor license which has nothing to do with us, so what I'm trying to talk about is when I look at the definition, I think that are we trying to say that a brewery would be something larger than a microbrewery?

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, then I think that definition should say that it produces more than 930,000 gallons, right, to make clear because the definition of brewery just is a place that manufactures beer.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: We're not talking about production, we're talking about the size of building.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, not at all, look at the definition.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: I've got it, 2,500 square feet.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, no, no. You're talking about whether or

not they have to come in, you're talking about the use and whether or not they have to get a waiver. Look up top at the definitions.

MR. ENRIGHT: How about adding to the brewery a place that manufactures beer and is licensed by the state of Illinois that produces more than a microbrewery would?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Fine, yes. That's kind of what I'm looking for. It seems to me that the definition of brew pub means restaurant first, brewery second; whereas brewery and microbrewery are production of beer first, potentially there might be food there, that's a liquor license issue, but really the focus is on the brewery. Is that correct?

MR. ENRIGHT: That's correct.

MS. EGAN: We're licensed as a brew pub though by the Federal Government. I mean everything is semantics, but I have a brew pub license in Itasca and I don't sell food is the other thing.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay. Well, that's going to be the liquor license differentiating.

MS. EGAN: Right.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Unfortunately, all villages are going to have different definitions.

MS. EGAN: Well, that was in the state.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, no, I know, but our zoning codes are all going to be different.

MS. EGAN: Sure.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I can understand the frustration, but really if we made it align by the state, next door wouldn't and we just didn't make it work for us, right?

MS. EGAN: Right, right.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, this is just a matter of zoning. But that was really I think where I was getting hung up on. I don't know if I would include this generally characterized by an emphasis on quality. I mean it just seems like we're making an opinion that microbreweries are better than breweries. I don't think it's necessary. I think microbrewery means smaller, brewery means bigger, both mean brewed on site. Correct?

MR. ENRIGHT: Right.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, I think the quality of it is irrelevant or what their emphasis is. So, I think we can simplify it that way. I don't know that we need to go so far as to say that the brewery is the, I think it's clear then, I think we know that brew pub is a restaurant first. So, if you don't have a, if you're not a restaurant first, then you'd have to fall under brewery, and then it comes down to how much do you produce on site on whether or not you're a brewery or a microbrewery. That seems to me very simple. Okay? Does anyone else have any comments or questions?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: No, I think that you make a good point.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: It seems to make sense, yes.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay.

MS. EGAN: I think, so there's tasting or a tap room, so large breweries sometimes when you go on a tour will give you a taste, and that's regulated by the state and the Federal Government as well. You can have a little bit, like a three-ounce tasting or whatever the case may be and you don't charge for it, it's part of a tour maybe, where a tap room would be an

actual bar area attached to a brewery where you would serve beer or alcohol and charge for it. Then like I said, you know, in Itasca or Mount Prospect, there is no limit, but in other towns there's like a 48-ounce, like Naperville has 48-ounces for sample as example. So, in 24 hours, you're allowed to serve so much alcohol and then you're kept at that amount per person for a 24-hour period.

MR. ENRIGHT: These are all things that are part of the liquor license.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Right.

MS. EGAN: Right.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, these are not issues for us.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Right. So, tap room, so explain for me, I get that it's not an issue for us, I just want to understand. So, would you have a microbrewery without a tap room? So, that would just be one that only sells beer on the premises but doesn't do tastings?

MR. ENRIGHT: It depends on the liquor license, and each individual business is different.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, I'm just trying to understand. So, that's where it would fall under, a tap room would be a liquor license level for a microbrewery, but a microbrewery that didn't have a tap room liquor license couldn't serve anything on site? Is that --

MR. ENRIGHT: No, all these can serve on site.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, why would you need a tap room license?

MR. ENRIGHT: I am not aware of a tap room license, I don't know if there's any difference.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay, all right. I get it, I get what you're saying, okay. So, there is this tap room license concept out there but it may or may not apply to Arlington Heights because we feel that we've got it covered in our definitions. Agree, no, I agree, that clarifies it for me. Thanks.

MR. ENRIGHT: We don't need to address that in the zoning.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, I understand.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Right.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Right.

MR. ENRIGHT: Just to make it clear.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I understand. I was just trying to figure out where it fell, that's all.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay. Did you have any other comments?

MS. EGAN: I don't think so. Do you have any other questions?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: No, other than I live in that area, so yay.

MR. VALENTE: Me, too, I'm a resident there, too.

MS. EGAN: We're hoping for that, right.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Kathleen, I do have a question for you. So, you own property?

MS. EGAN: And rent, we have a ten-year lease and we own a property on that same street. So, we own at 19 North and 3 North, we rent at 3 North, we own at 19 North.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: In one of your properties, you have equipment in there ready to start brewing?

MS. EGAN: 3 North, yes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Are these both commercial properties?

MS. EGAN: Yes. Yes, right? I believe so.

MR. ENRIGHT: I just want to caution the Plan Commission that they will have to be moving forward with a petition regarding zoning.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Sure.

MR. ENRIGHT: And if we talk about their specific project, it has to be part of the public hearing, so I'd just caution.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Got it. Got it.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Right. We're not in a position to do that.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I understand. We're just clarifying. It's interesting to get a perspective from somebody who's going through the process.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: So, thank you.

MS. EGAN: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Is there anyone else in the audience that would like to --

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Add to the confusion.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Add to the confusion.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Any more breweries you guys want to open up? No?

CHAIRMAN ENNES: So, we're going to close the public portion of the hearing, and I would open deliberation of the Commissioners for any other comments or a motion.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: We've got one, Terry. Terry?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Oh, we've got someone here.

MR. GALLANT: Sorry.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: You waited until I closed the public portion, but that's okay.

MR. GALLANT: Oh, sorry about that.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Come and join us.

MR. GALLANT: It will be quick question. Marc Gallant, M-a-r-c G-a-l-l-a-n-t. So, the Zoning Commission, I guess I'd like to understand, it was a Manufacturing zone before and now it's not, that was changed, is that what --

CHAIRMAN ENNES: I'm not sure, what are you talking about?

MR. GALLANT: The zoning of the Hickory area.

MR. ENRIGHT: That's correct.

MR. GALLANT: Okay, and now it's not. Is that in anticipation of plans they have for that area because of all the construction that's going on there and it's going to be turned over? Because you have Hines there now of course and then you have the auto body shop. So, I'm just curious.

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes, the idea is to transition that whole area to mixed use residentials and commercial over time.

MR. GALLANT: That was just my question.

MR. ENRIGHT: The Board rezoned those properties when it adopted the redevelopment plan four years ago for that area. So, we're in the process of implementing it with different developers right now.

MR. GALLANT: You're educating me so I appreciate this. So, if there was a process to try to allow these types of businesses in that area, because it's going to be maybe mixed use, that would have to be something we bring back here?

MR. ENRIGHT: That's correct.

MR. GALLANT: And ask for it to be rezoned again, is that how it works?

MR. ENRIGHT: A land use variation to allow a use that's not permitted.

MR. GALLANT: Or a variation.

MR. ENRIGHT: Yes, a variation.

MR. GALLANT: Right. Thanks.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Thank you. Anyone else? Okay, we're going to close the public portion of the hearing, and I'm going to ask the Commissioners for their deliberation or for a motion.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I'm sorry, I was going to ask, I'm happy to move forward with a motion, but do you feel that we need to revise any language at all or do you have that written down? How would the motion be worded?

MR. ENRIGHT: I don't think you need to do anything in my opinion. This is based on size. A brewery is a brewery, bigger; a micro is a micro.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Up to this size, and then it's bigger.

MR. ENRIGHT: So, we're the ones who have to, you know, enforce it and we're trying to match this up with the language in the liquor licenses, too. So, we start tweaking this too much, then we'd have to tweak some language in there, too, which is fine, but it's really up to you if you want to make a motion.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: So, if I wanted to make a motion with the revision still in the language, I would need to restate it?

MR. ENRIGHT: Well, I would need to know what you really wanted to say.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay, that was my clarifying question, but I do disagree. I think the language as written is very unclear. As a lawyer who has to read our code and other towns' codes on behalf of my clients, I'd like to make it clear so people understand it.

MR. ENRIGHT: All right. Do you have anything to state it?

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: You were going to make a motion?

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: I was going to make the motion, but if you want to make some revision for this motion --

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Well, I'll make a motion with the language how I would like it to read.

A motion to recommend to the Village Board of Trustees approval of PC#18-012, Amendments to Chapter 28, Section 28-3 and Section 28-5.5-1, Regarding Brew Pubs, Microbreweries, and Breweries, with the proposed language, however, with the change that the definition of brewery be changed to include that it brews more than 930,000 gallons of beer per year, and the definition of microbrewery to eliminate the language from generally characterized by an emphasis on quality, flavor, and such down to the comma there so it would read an independently-owned brewery that produces no more than 930,000 gallons of beer per year and which is licensed as a Class I brewer by the state of Illinois.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: So, are you --

MR. ENRIGHT: That's a motion, so you need to have a second.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Right, we have a motion. Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: I'll second that.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Any questions?

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Yes, I just have a comment. To me, by taking that out, you're, at least I erased what I was thinking a microbrewery would be. If you leave out that emphasis on technique and the display of the equipment and everything which I think is part of the experience of going to a microbrewery, you just changed, in my mind it's a little more confusing. I had it the other way, the way it was worded here. So, that's just my comment.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, any other questions or comments on the motion? Okay, could you take a roll call vote?

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Dawson.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Green.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: No.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Lorenzini.

COMMISSIONER LORENZINI: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: Commissioner Sigalos.

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: And Chairman Ennes.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: Four to one.

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Yes.

MR. ENRIGHT: So, that will go to the Village Board probably June 4th.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay, thank you.

MR. ENRIGHT: That's all we have. No other business.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: I just have a quick question, you can probably close it before I ask it. But I had a resident ask me about the status of the Sigwalt Apartments saying that they had been told both that it's dead and that it's on hold?

MR. ENRIGHT: The Village Board denied it. They voted four to four, so they didn't have the total for approval. So, we have not had any other conversations with that.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: All right. So, it's not technically considered on hold? I don't even know what that would mean.

MR. ENRIGHT: The petition failed, so any developer that wanted to build there would have to start from the beginning.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Okay.

MR. ENRIGHT: And we have not had any conversations with any developers since that vote was taken.

COMMISSIONER DAWSON: Sure, that helps me clarify it. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Okay. I see no other business on our agenda, could I have a motion to adjourn?

COMMISSIONER GREEN: So moved.

COMMISSIONER SIGALOS: I'd like to make a motion to adjourn.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: Second?

COMMISSIONER GREEN: Second.

CHAIRMAN ENNES: All in favor?

(Chorus of ayes.)

CHAIRMAN ENNES: We're adjourned. Thank you.

(Whereupon, the above-mentioned petition was
adjourned at 8:01 p.m.)

Section 28-3

Brewery. A place that manufactures beer and is licensed as such by the State of Illinois.

Brew pub. A restaurant that includes a brewery as an accessory use and is licensed as a brew pub by the State of Illinois.

Microbrewery. An independently owned brewery that produces no more than 930,000 gallons of beer per year, generally characterized by an emphasis on quality, flavor and brewing technique, and often selling its products only locally, and which is licensed as a Class 1 brewer by the State of Illinois.
